# ALPHA ZONE

## WARRANT SERVICE

140 Warrenton Road. A deputy observed an individual who had an active warrant. Attempting to conduct an arrest at their residence, the suspect fled the scene. Deputies pursued the suspect on foot when the suspect suddenly fell. The suspect was subsequently arrested. The suspect was identified and charged with fleeing from law enforcement and served with his outstanding warrant. He was held at Rappahannock Regional Jail without bond.

## DUI

77 Hulls Chapel Road. Deputies responded to a hit-and-run report in the area. Upon making contact, deputies noticed a strong odor of alcohol emanating from the driver's breath. Instructed to exit the vehicle and discuss the vehicle's damage, the driver claimed not to have been drinking alcohol that day. A field sobriety test was administered, and a breath sample was retrieved. The driver then claimed to have had two alcoholic shots earlier that day. The driver was subsequently arrested. Two bottles of alcohol were later found inside the driver's vehicle. At the Sheriff's Office, the driver claimed not to have remembered hitting another vehicle. Surveillance footage confirmed that the driver backed into the victim's vehicle. The driver was identified and charged with driving under the influence, failure to fix a defect after inspection, and a misdemeanor hit-and-run. He was held on a secured bond at Rappahannock Regional Jail.



# BRAVO ZONE

## **PUBLIC INTOXICATION**

7-Eleven 324 White Oak Road. A deputy responded to a suspicious vehicle report. Information was provided that the suspect had been stationary for over three hours. When asked to leave by store employees, the driver became argumentative. The store manager requested that the driver trespass from the property. Upon making contact, the driver claimed that they were awaiting a call from their parent and had no gas in the vehicle. The driver indicated signs of impairment with a strong odor of alcohol emanating from their breath. The deputy observed an open case of alcoholic beverages in the backseat of the vehicle, which the driver denied was theirs. The driver claimed they had only been at the store for one hour. The deputy provided his phone to make a call to a family member and advised that the driver had been trespassed. The driver was also arrested for public intoxication. The driver was identified and charged with public intoxication and held at Rappahannock Regional Jail until sober.

## **WARRANT SERVICES**

35 Town and Country Drive. Deputies observed an individual wanted for felony-related firearms charges out of Washington, D.C. Upon making contact, the deputy confirmed the suspect's identification, and they were subsequently arrested. The suspect was identified and charged with fugitive from justice and held at Rappahannock Regional Jail without bond.



# CHARLIE ZONE

## **FRAUD**

32 Walker Way. A deputy responded to a fraud complaint regarding identity theft. The victim reported that they had been notified by their bank of fraudulent attempts to open a Target credit card. The bank stopped the credit card from being opened and gave the victim a new bank card. Recently, the victim had been receiving text messages and emails from "Synchrony Bank" to make payments on an outstanding balance. The victim contacted the fraudulent bank, which informed them of three outstanding accounts. The victim then again notified their legitimate bank of these fraudulent attempts. Deputy advised the victim to also alert the credit bureaus of the fraudulent activity.

## **LARCENY**

33 Perchwood Drive. Deputies responded to a larceny report of a missing trailer. After making contact, the victim stated that a trailer on their property had gone missing on March 2, 2026. The trailer had been loaned to different vendors throughout the years, but after following up, each vendor denied taking it. The victim did not have any cameras on their property to identify the suspect. A deputy advised the victim that the trailer's tag would be entered as stolen and to contact the Sheriff's Office if it is returned.

## **VANDALISM**

Belle Plains Boat Club 994 Belle Plains Road. A deputy responded to a vandalism complaint. Information was provided that a broken window pane of the clubhouse had been discovered that night, along with a flipped wooden table. The deputy identified that the majority of the glass was on the inside of the clubhouse, indicating that the window was broken from the outside. The rest of the clubhouse was untouched, and the size of the window was too small for the suspect to fit through, indicating there was no entry made. The deputy advised the victim to contact him if there was any evidence caught on the on-site cameras.

## **DUI**

Hospital Center Boulevard and Care Lane. A deputy responded to an intoxicated driver complaint in the area. Upon making contact, the deputy observed the vehicle remaining stationary despite the traffic light being green. Attempting to conduct a traffic stop, the suspect's vehicle proceeded before pulling into the Stafford Hospital parking lot. The driver indicated signs of impairment with a strong odor of alcohol emanating from their breath, bloodshot eyes, and slurred speech. The driver claimed that they had only had one drink. After being asked to exit the vehicle, the driver began arguing with the deputy and stumbling backwards. They were subsequently arrested under suspicion of driving under the influence. The suspect was identified and charged with driving under the influence and stopping on the highway. He was held at Rappahannock Regional Jail without bond.

Coal Landing Road and Richmond Highway. A deputy responded to a disabled vehicle report. Upon making contact, the deputy identified the vehicle in a ditch with no occupants inside. A vehicle then arrived on scene, and an individual claimed that it was their vehicle in the ditch. The individual then claimed to have been drinking earlier in the evening and lost control of the vehicle on a turn. The individual indicated signs of impairment with an odor of alcohol emanating from their breath and glassy eyes. A field sobriety test was administered, and the driver was subsequently arrested. A breath sample confirmed the driver's blood alcohol content to be above the legal limit. The driver was identified and charged with driving under the influence and was held at Rappahannock Regional Jail until sober.



# DELTA ZONE

## **LARCENY**

Kohl's 1220 Stafford Market Place. A deputy responded to a larceny complaint regarding a shoplifting incident. Information was provided that the suspect had concealed clothing, jewelry, and skincare items before leaving without paying. Reportedly, the suspect entered the store and placed several items in their cart. The suspect then entered the fitting rooms twice for extended periods of time. Notably, the suspect's bag had doubled in size, and their cart had fewer items after exiting the fitting rooms. The suspect proceeded to pay for one item before leaving the store. Employees entered the fitting rooms and found several tags that were ripped off the items, and two clothing items covered in vomit. Reviewing surveillance footage, the deputy used the description of the car, the name provided by the suspect at checkout, and a DMV photo to identify the suspect. Upon making contact with the subject, the deputy recovered the stolen items and returned them to the store. Suspect was charged with shoplifting and was released on a summons.

Ulta 1150 Stafford Market Place. A deputy responded to a larceny report. An employee reported that the suspect placed merchandise into a duffel bag covered by a coat as they walked around the store. A detailed list of items revealed that 92 items were stolen by the suspect. Surveillance footage provided the deputy with images of the suspect, along with identifying that they left the store on foot.

## **HIT AND RUN**

220 Garrisonville Road. The deputy responded to a traffic accident report in the area. Upon making contact, the victim reported that they were stopped at a red light when they were rear-ended by the suspect. Reportedly, the suspect initially stopped to provide their insurance but then subsequently fled the scene. The victim was able to get a photo of the suspect's insurance card, but it was later discovered expired.

## **WARRANT SERVICE**

Hampton Oaks Elementary School 107 Northampton Boulevard. A deputy responded to an alarm. After checking for points of entry, a vehicle was observed leaving the school and was subsequently stopped. Upon investigation, it was revealed that the driver was wanted out of Maryland for failing to appear in court. The driver was identified and charged with fugitive from justice and held at Rappahannock Regional Jail without bond.

## **PUBLIC INTOXICATION**

Sheetz 1175 Garrisonville Road. A deputy responded to an intoxicated driver complaint. Upon making contact, the driver claimed to have had 2-3 alcoholic beverages, and a field sobriety test was administered. The driver was subsequently arrested and taken to the Sheriff's Office. A breath sample confirmed the driver's blood alcohol content was above the legal limit. The driver was identified and charged with driving under the influence and held at Rappahannock Regional Jail until sober.

# SCAM REPORT

**Victim** began communicating with the suspect regarding a rental property. The suspect instructed the victim to send funds for a background check. After sending the initial funds, the victim received secondary requests from the suspect to send additional funds. The victim refused, and the suspect began threatening to kill the victim and their family. The victim identified that there were two suspects during the phone conversations. One of the suspects claimed to work for a real estate company. The victim subsequently blocked the suspects on Facebook and WhatsApp. The deputy advised the victim that it appeared to be a scam and not to send additional funds or meet with the suspects. The deputy also advised freezing the victim's bank accounts and monitoring for unauthorized transactions.
