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
# **Stafford At A Glance**

In 1664, Stafford County became one of the first counties in Colonial Virginia to appoint a sheriff. Since then, a long line of sheriffs have served the county, including many who influenced the direction of our young nation, such as George Mason and William Fitzhugh. Sheriff David P. Decatur became Stafford's 108th Sheriff in 2016. Today, the Stafford County Sheriff's Office has 271 members and is responsible for law enforcement, court operations, emergency communications and community engagement.

Stafford County is a vibrant and growing community whose citizens are focused on preserving its historic treasures, many of which played an important role in the events that shaped our nation's history. For example, George Washington grew up at his boyhood home on the banks of the Rappahannock River in Falmouth, Aquia sandstone was quarried for the White House and the U.S. Capitol at Government Island, and many African American slaves traveled the "Trail to Freedom" through Stafford's Aquia Landing. The Stafford Sheriff's Office is honored to protect these historic assets and works closely with citizens, businesses and the Stafford County School system to preserve them for future generations.

# **Sheriff's Message**

Since I became Sheriff in January 2016, I've been humbled by the wide-ranging support I have received from our citizens. It is heartening to know that in a time when the national spotlight is focused on the role of law enforcement in America, our partnership with our community remains on favorable ground. You will see evidence of this throughout this Annual Report, in our crime prevention programs, patrol operations and community engagement initiatives.

That is not to say that we do not have challenges in these changing times. In 2016, we saw an increase in assaults on our deputies. One of our deputies, Brandon Boyle, was shot five times after responding to a domestic call. Despite his pain and injuries, his first concern was for the safety of the other deputies who were with him on that call. He also wanted to ensure his family would be safe and cared for. After many surgeries, Brandon successfully returned to duty.

Our deputies are always on alert, but we were all in a state of

heightened awareness after Brandon's shooting. We faced other challenges as well. We played a greater role in traffic investigations and other areas. Although our crime rate was flat in 2016, we had some significant crimes take place in our county.

The positive side to these challenges is that they have helped us sharpen our focus on advancing transparency and accountability initiatives factors that further strengthen community trust. We focused on specific areas to make us even better. Those areas are: Investing in People, Partnering with Our Community, Promoting Safety with Technology, Combating Crime and Enhancing

Our Professionalism. You'll see these areas referred Deputy Brandon Boyle to throughout this report.

We made progress in 2016, but we have our work for 2017 cut out for us. Limited resources will continue to challenge us. Technology is one area that must remain a priority because it will help us fight and prevent crime. The opiate crisis plagues us every day, and our continued use of Narcan will help save those who still battle addiction. Mental health crises demand a large amount of time from our staff, and we will continue to look for



partnerships to help us better respond to these situations.


Fortunately, because of our strong community roots, we know we are not alone in facing these challenges. When Brandon







# **Overview** — Sheriff's Office Budget

The Stafford County Sheriff's Office budget is but one piece of the overall Stafford County budget. For the FY 2017 (July 1, 2015 - June 30, 2016) the total County budget was \$265.5 million. The Sheriff's Office budget was \$24,758,403 or 9.3% of the overall County Budget.

The 9% slice of the County Government's budget pie divides into three major categories totaling \$24,758,403





**Personnel costs** include the salaries and benefits of the 271 Sheriff's Office employees.

**Operating Costs** deal with the day-to-day operations of the Sheriff's Office to include training, technology and fuel.

**Capital Costs** include vehicles and associated equipment for the Sheriff's Office.

# Overview — Keeping You Connected

The Stafford County Sheriff's Office is committed to being transparent and accountable to Stafford citizens. A key tool to fulfill that goal is communication. The Sheriff's Public Information Officer (PIO) serves as the spokesperson for the Sheriff's Office and is on call 24 hours a day/365 days a year for media needs. The PIO is responsible for routine contact with all media outlets, disseminates information on lost children/adults and wanted criminals and responds to information requests from the public on a daily basis. In addition, the Public Information Officer acts as the Sheriff's Office photographer and social media coordinator.



The Sheriff's Office has Facebook (Office of Stafford County Sheriff) and Twitter (@StaffcoSheriff) and both sites have been instrumental in helping to spread the word on various events and issues. In fact, the infographic to the left received 30,000 views when it was posted on the Sheriff's social media sites in 2016. Sheriff's Office personnel were eager to raise awareness of this issue so that citizens would not become victims of frauds and other crimes.










# **Overview** — **Organizational Chart**

In 2016, the Stafford Sheriff's Office was divided into two bureaus: Operations and Support Services. Each bureau is led by a Major, who oversees a number of divisions and sections. The new structure is helping to increase accountability and enhance transparency, teamwork and collaboration across the agency. The new structure will also allow staff to focus on proactive crime prevention and community policing. Details on each bureau are provided later in this report.





Our staff members are the agency's greatest resources; investing in them through training, promotions and other opportunities remained a top priority.




# **Overview** — County Coverage

The Sheriff's Office staff covers a lot of ground each day keeping Stafford's 142,380 citizens safe. In 2016, the agency was able to augment its current staff with nine additional positions. Every new law enforcement officer enhances the services the Sheriff's Office provides to its citizens.

Stafford is divided into four patrol areas. Each area is comprised of smaller zones. Deputies routinely patrol the same geographic areas, allowing them to get to know the streets, neighborhoods, businesses and people. Forming relationships and building trust is at the very heart of community policing.



# **Assaults on Deputies**




Each year, deputies put their lives on the line to protect Stafford County. The graph above shows the number of assaults on deputies over the past five years.

# **Overview** — **Deputy Performance**

The image of the Stafford County Sheriff's Office depends on the personal integrity and discipline of each and every one of the Sheriff's Office employees. The Sheriff's Office encourages citizens to bring forward legitimate grievances regarding misconduct by personnel. The Sheriff's Office investigates all complaints made by citizens. In addition, many of the complaints investigated are internally initiated by the Sheriff's Office. Proactive internal investigations ensure the public that Sheriff's Office personnel adhere to the highest standards in performance.

# **Personnel Complaints**

In 2016 the Stafford County Sheriff's Office responded to 129,090 calls for service. The 47 personnel investigations accounted for less than .036% of all the calls responded to by Sheriff's Office Personnel. Of the 47 cases investigated for policy violation and complaints, 27 resulted in a sustained violation.



Two D.A.R.E. Officers cover all of Stafford's elementary schools. Each middle and high school has a School Resource Officer.





# AWARDS

The Sheriff's Office held its annual awards ceremony in May 2016 to honor law enforcement personnel who have provided exemplary service to the community.

Sheriff David Decatur presented honorees with awards for their actions and performance. Meritorious Awards were given for emergencies in which a Sheriff's Office member demonstrated judgment, ingenuity or performance that clearly exceeds what is required and expected. Commendation Awards were given in instances during which a Sheriff's Office member demonstrated exemplary service. Traffic Safety Awards were given to deputies for traffic safety prevention, education and enforcement. Community Awards were given to citizens for their long time support of the Sheriff's Office. A Unit Citation Award was given for overall excellence during a specific event or incident.

Individuals were selected by an Awards Committee consisting of personnel from the Operations Division, Criminal Investigations Division, Civil/Court Division, Emergency Communications Center and Administrative Services. Individuals were nominated by other deputies or personnel of the Sheriff's Office. The committee evaluated the nominations and forwarded them to the Sheriff for his review and action.



# **Civilian Recognition**

Each year, the Stafford County Sheriff's Office recognizes its civilian employees who have provided exemplary service to the community and the Sheriff's Office. A ceremony is held in May to honor the efforts of civilian personnel and to recognize four individuals who personify the core values of the Sheriff's Office: Integrity, Compassion, Fairness and Professionalism.

Master Detective Timothy Covington, shown in first photo at right, was the recipient of the Medal of Valor for rescuing a man from the icy waters of Aquia Creek. The Medal of Valor is the highest award given by the Stafford County Sheriff's Office. Deputy First Class Andrew Spotts, shown wearing a uniform in the second photo at right, received the Silver Star for exposing himself to great personal risk. Deputy Spotts was recognized for his efforts to assist an individual who had set himself on fire. He also rescued an elderly woman from that individual's home which was filling rapidly with thick smoke. His quick response allowed the fire to be contained and saved the life of the elderly woman.

We built more meaningful relationships with citizens and businesses through annual events and new experiences.

Community engagement and outreach are a priority for the Stafford County Sheriff's Office. In 2016, the Sheriff's Office enhanced existing relationships with community groups as well as established new partnerships. Opportunities to interact with the citizens, businesses and civic groups of Stafford County allow the Sheriff's Office to better understand and serve the needs of the community. Community programs include the Law Enforcement Cadet Program, Citizens' Police Academy, Project Lifesaver, Neighborhood Watch, R.A.D., TRIAD, and D.A.R.E. Basketball Fundraiser, to name a few. Car Seat inspections are provided by deputies who are certified car seat technicians. The Crime Prevention Unit makes DNA Kits available and is a resource for the entire community. Crime reports are also available on the Sheriff's Office website www.staffordsheriff.com. In addition, the Sheriff's Office participates in the following programs:

## **Stafford County Public Schools**

School Resource Officers are in all middle and high schools, and two D.A.R.E. Officers work with elementary students.

High schools also have the Youth of Virginia Speak Out (YOVASO) leadership program that focuses on saving the lives of teenage drivers. Deputies assigned to the Traffic Unit work with the school YOVASO Sponsor.

In 2016, the "Save Your Tailgate, Buckle Up" safety belt campaign was a huge success. Dixon-Smith and A.G. Dixon-Smith Middle School won first place and \$500 in a statewide middle school competition. Deputy Mindy Warnick is the school's resource officer and assisted with the campaign.

#### **Crime Solvers**

Crime Solvers is a non-profit community-based organization that works with the Sheriff's Office and the community to combat crime. The group pays individuals for tips that lead to the arrest and conviction of suspects involved in crimes. Crime Solvers holds several fundraising events, such as the

#### **Badges for Baseball**

During this annual summer program, Stafford Deputies serve as mentors and coaches to youth from community-based organizations. The goal of the five-day camp is to teach kids the fundamentals of baseball, foster a

relationship with coaches and mentors and expan participants' life skills. A character education curriculum is also included.

## **Special Olympics**

The Sheriff's Office supports Special Olympics every year and participates in the program's events such as the Torch Run and other

# **Partnerships**

## **Special Star Force Cadets**

The Sheriff's Office developed the Sheriff's Special Star Force Cadets, a program designed for young people with intellectual challenges, ages 13-22. Cadets experience various duties of a law enforcement officer in a safe and hazard free environment. The program is intended to be an educational and community service based program.

## **National Night Out**

National Night Out is an annual event held at Stafford Marketplace that promotes police-community partnerships and neighborhood camaraderie to make our neighborhoods safer and more caring places to live. Stafford's National Night Out has been recognized by the National Association of Town Watch. Participation and attendance in this celebration grow every year. In addition to the event at Stafford Marketplace, several neighborhoods throughout Stafford host their own National Night Out community events.

## **Annual Christmas Shopping Spree**

The Sheriff's Annual Christmas Shopping Spree provides \$100 for 100 children in the community to purchase toys and clothes for themselves. Keeping in the Christmas spirit, the children also purchase gifts for family members.




# **Operations Bureau**

The Field Operations Division of the Operations Bureau responds to citizens' calls for service and is also responsible for proactive initiatives. Field Operations Division staff would also manage the first responder tasks should a terrorist attack occur in Stafford County and assist other law enforcement agencies as the need arises. Field Operations is organized into two primary units: Patrol and Special Services. Patrol staff respond to calls for service from citizens and provide preventive patrol through their presence in an area. Special Services is responsible for Juvenile Services, which provide D.A.R.E. Officers and School Resource Officers to Stafford County Public Schools. Also included in the Special Services function is the Traffic Safety Unit, which manages the control of traffic movement, enforcement of traffic laws and the reduction of traffic collisions through directed enforcement and proactive crime prevention. In addition, Special Services is responsible for the Crime Prevention Unit, Special Operations Unit, Auxiliary Special Deputies, Cadets, Special Weapons and Tactics Unit, the Marine Unit, and the Drone Unit. The Operations Bureau is also in charge of the Court Services Division and Animal Control.








## **Crime Rate Per 100 Residents**


# **Crimes Against Persons**




# **Crimes Against Property**

# **Criminal Arrests**




Criminal arrests continued to decline in Stafford in 2016 thanks to the Sheriff's Office's enhanced focus on proactive policing and increased community engagement.




# Field Operations Division — Traffic Safety Statistics


## **Total Traffic Accidents**




## **Total Fatal Traffic Crashes**

# **Volunteers**




# **Knocking Out Addiction**

According to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, the United States is in the midst of an unprecedented opioid epidemic. The Centers for Disease Control states that from 2000 to 2015, more than half a million people died from drug overdoses and that 91 Americans die every day from an opioid overdose. Stafford is not immune to this plague. From 2012 to 2016, Narcotic Violations increased 27%. To help combat this crisis, the Sheriff's Office has implemented many programs. All deputies were trained in the use of Narcan, a lifesaving nasal spray that neutralizes heroin/opiate overdoses. In addition, the Sheriff's Office set up the Youth At-Risk Committee, a group of parents, local business owners, educators

and law enforcement personnel, whose main focus is committed to educating the public on potentially dangerous substances, drugs or practices in which some young people may be engaging in Stafford County. In addition, the Sheriff's Office has teamed up with the Knockout Addiction program officials to raise awareness of the drug addiction problem in the Stafford, Fredericksburg and Spotsylvania region.

# Overdoses and Narcan Uses by the Sheriff's Office



All of Stafford's deputies began carrying Narcan in their vehicles in August 2016. The figures above show the drug activity from September - December 2016 and the impact of Narcan. In 2016, since the inception of the Narcan program, 23 lives have been saved from fatal overdoses.




Animal Control is divided in two components, Enforcement (Animal Control Officers) and Shelter Caretakers. Animal Control Officers conduct routine patrol public safety measures to ensure a safe coexistence with animals and people, provide education presentations and respond to complaints concerning animals. Additional duties include impounding stray, sick or injured domestic animals. Animal Control Officers work with other agencies to place animals. Shelter staff handles adoption, redemption and euthanizing when necessary.

In 2016, 314 animals were transferred, resulting in a reduction of daily pet populations, staff workload, veterinarian care costs and stress on animals. In addition, 20 animals were spayed or neutered with the assistance from DMV Pet Friendly license plate sales.

# **Support Services Bureau**

The Support Services Bureau consists of the Criminal Investigations Division, the Administrative Services Division, the Professional Standards Unit and the Emergency Communications Division. Staff monitors and coordinates technology initiatives, service delivery programs, crime patterns and data shifts, budget efficiencies, community expectations and the impact of new laws and regulations on the provision of law enforcement.

# **Criminal Investigations Division**

#### **Major Crimes Unit**

The Major Crimes Unit handles the assignment and investigation of all major crimes. These include murder, rape, robbery, kidnapping, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny and motor vehicle theft. The total cases assigned to the Criminal Investigations Division is 1,915.

# **Major Cases**

The Stafford County Sheriff's Office relies heavily on teamwork to solve crimes. One such case occurred in October 2016 when a multi-week investigation led to the arrest of Darrell John Edwards, who was charged with Distribution of Heroin, Possession with Intent to Distribute Heroin, Possession of a Firearm by a Convicted Felon and Possession of a Firearm with Schedule 1 Narcotics. Also arrested was April Anne Coles, who was charged with Possession with Intent to Distribute Heroin.

Another case involved a brutal sexual assault of a driver

along Kings Highway on October 31, 2016. Roberto Carlos Flores Sibrian was arrested in November in North Carolina. The Sheriff's Office worked with many partner agencies to locate the suspect including Immigration and Customs Enforcement, Lee County North Carolina Sheriff's Office, North Carolina State Highway Patrol, Spotsylvania County Sheriff's Office,


## **Administrative Services Division**

The Administrative Services Division provides support for all Sheriff's Office operations including Records Management, Evidence Processing, Departmental Property, Data Entry, Accounting Review, Computer Hardware and Software, Fleet Management, Accreditation Management, Technological Research and Warrants. The Administrative Services Division provides support from behind the scenes with the ultimate responsibility of ensuring that all divisions can perform their responsibilities without interruptions and obtain the required performance levels for the citizens of Stafford County and the Commonwealth of Virginia.

## **Professional Standards Unit**

Professional Standards is comprised of four separate units, Human Resources, Training, Internal Affairs and Finance. Human Resources is responsible for the recruitment and hiring of all Sheriff's Office personnel. HR staff administers employee benefits and maintains personnel records. Training staff is responsible for the documentation, certification and implementation of all training requirements. Training coordinators develop training programs and schedule all specialized training. Internal Affairs is responsible for providing oversight for the Sheriff's Office. The Internal Affairs inspector receives and investigates complaints from the community concerning Sheriff's Office personnel. Finance administers the Sheriff's Office's budget ensuring employee payroll is correct and all expenditures are processed accurately and timely. Finance also administers all state and federal grants.



# **Support Services Bureau — Emergency Communications**

The Emergency Communications Division is part of the Support Services Bureau and is staffed 24 hours a day, 365 days a year supporting operations through an ever-changing comprehensive communications infrastructure. Many improvements in 2016 enhanced the services that this division provided to the community. Pictometry was added to the division's computer-aided dispatch (CAD) stations to allow dispatchers to see overhead pictures of locations and measure distances, all to aid in better dissemination of information to first responders. In addition, school floor plans were also added to CAD stations for dispatchers to view when communicating with first responders.

## **Total CAD Incidents Processed**




The Emergency Communications Division processed a total of 160,827 incidents in 2016. The chart above shows the type and number of incidents that dispatchers received. The majority of incidents are related to law enforcement issues, but Fire and Rescue, Utility calls after hours and Animal Control calls are also part of the division's daily workload.





Dispatchers in the Emergency Communications Division face stressful situations every day, but their intense training and professionalism ensure that anyone who calls 911 will hear a calm voice on the other end of the line.

In memory of our fallen brother, Deputy Sheriff Ford Tyson "Toby" Humphrey, who lost his life in the pursuit of serving and protecting the citizens of Stafford County. On October 9, 1980, 26-year-old Ford Tyson "Toby" Humphrey was killed in the line of duty by a gunman while attempting to quell a domestic disturbance. Deputy Humphrey served his community as a Deputy Sheriff as well as a volunteer member of the Fredericksburg Rescue Squad.

He served in the United States Marine Corps in Al-asad, Iraq, had been a boy scout and was also a volunteer fireman with Stafford Company 2 at the time of his death.
